REMEMBERING TONY WILSON

Edward Torres, June 2019, reminiscing; "Seems only yesterday my dear departed friend, Tony Wilson, and I played for this event. How time flies..."

PASADENA HOLDS STREET FESTIVAL, JUNE, 2015

The City of Pasadena held a street festival event on June 21, 2015 that took place on the promenade in front of the Pasadena Civic Auditorium. As part of this event, the Civic Auditorium held an Open-House where attendees could see the marvelous auditorium that opened in 1932. The city also wanted to show off the historic 5-manual/28-rank Möller theatre pipe organ that is installed there. I was the organist who played for this event.

It was originally thought that I would play for two hours starting around noon. The plan was for me to play for 45 minutes, take a 15 minute break and answer visitor questions about the organ, then play another 45 minute set, and so on. The management of the auditorium didn't anticipate much more than 50, maybe 100 visitors (in total).

I came in at 9:00 for some runtime on the organ and was joined by my wonderful student, Edward Torres. At 9:30 docents opened the auditorium because there was a small crowd waiting to come in. So, I started playing at 9:30 and continued for an hour and a half (roughly). During this time, there were many people in the auditorium listening to the organ. At this point, the consensus of the Pasadena Civic was that it would be ideal if the organ played continuously. Also, there was hope that I might play for the whole run of openhouse (9:30am to 3:30pm) which came out to about 6 hours.

Edward Torres originally came to try the organ before the doors opened, but the only practical way to make these extended and constant hours work was for Edward to help. Throughout the whole run, I played about 4-1/2 hours and Edward





about 1-1/2 hours. We both ended up doing periodic question & answers. The audience was completely fascinated with the organ; some didn't even know that the organ was installed there before they entered the theatre that day; and others wanted to know when and where they could hear more. This is when we put on our Los Angeles Theatre Organ Society (LATOS) "diplomat hats" and passed out postcards which explained what a theatre pipe organ is, and more about LATOS – including website info.

THE NUMBERS: 50 to 100 people were anticipated. But based on clicker-counts by docents and observation by key personnel there, it is estimated that about 3,000 people came into the auditorium throughout the event – with many staying to listen to the organ. Amazing!

WE HAD A WONDERFUL TIME!

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
