Larry Grundy
August 11, 1930 --- July 20, 2019

Lawrence (Larry) Eugene Grundy was born in South Bend Indiana in 1930. The Grundy family lived through the Great Depression but avoided its full effects as Larry's father held a steady job at Indiana Electric. After Larry graduated from high school, he attended the University of Cincinnati. Upon graduation in 1953, Larry and Lea Zoeller wed and set out to start their lives with Larry's newly minted Electrical Engineering degree; however, the U.S. Army intervened. Larry told Lea to stay in South Bend until his two-year draft commitment was served, but Lea directly told Larry, she goes where he goes. From this devotion came the births of their first two children in Fort Monmouth Army Base, New Jersey. The army was otherwise a forgettable two years for Larry, but not without his own mild rebellions -- among which, as the base movie projectionist, he would run "Gone With the Wind" for the officers without intermission.

The movie bug stayed with Larry as the family relocated to an apartment in the Los Feliz area of Southern California in 1955 and he started a job at Westrex, a sound production company. But despite enjoying being part of the Hollywood scene, his paycheck did not cover expenses for the family. (By this time, the number of children was increasing at the rate of one per annum, until they stopped at eight.) Fortuitously, his neighbor recruited Larry to work for a nationwide electrical contracting firm, Fischbach & Moore, where he ascended through the ranks for over 32 years to the rank of corporate vice president overseeing west coast operations.

### The Grundy Family Theatre Pipe Organ

When he was 12, Larry visited a theatre in downtown South Bend and fell in love with the sound of the Wurlitzer pipe organ. He would return, again-andagain, to attend the sing-along's, concerts, and classic

silent movie comedies featuring; Laurel & Hardy, Harold Lloyd and Buster Keaton.

Throughout school, attaining an engineering degree and starting family and career, Larry's love of the pipe organ sound was never far from



his mind. In the early 1960's, Larry fell in with a group of pipe organ enthusiasts who had, as hobbies, restored small theater pipe organs for their homes. Seeing this as the perfect marriage of his head (engineering), and heart (music), Larry decided to pursue assembling his own theatre pipe organ, unaware at the time that it would become a life-long project.

He purchased his first salvage pipe organ in 1966 from a local mortuary that no longer had the time or money to keep it playing. This was the first of five small organs acquired over the years from establishments such as churches and pizza parlors. Shortly after moving into their new, large, home in Hacienda Heights in 1968, Larry and Lea added a multiroom addition to accommodate a large pipe organ. The new structure included a family room, mixing chamber, and pipe chambers. A small-scale temporary organ was assembled and made playable. Larry knew how to play one song: "It's a Small World."

In 1989, they moved to their rural retirement property in Fallbrook. Larry and Lea decided rather than adding on to the family home, they would build a separate, 1,200 sq. foot organ building.



Construction of the organ building started in 1992 and was completed in 1994. The final refurbishment and assembly of all five smaller organs into one grand instrument took the course of 10 years and was finished and dedicated in 2004. The completed organ comprised 20 ranks of pipes, and 10 sets of percussion instruments and sound effects, and would have been suitable for servicing a large movie theater.

Long after his retirement from electrical contracting, Larry officially entered the organ restoration and maintenance business in 2008 as president and co-

founder of Knight Organ Company. Throughout the years, Larry donated his time, expertise and financial support in helping refurbish organs throughout the country. Including; the Grand Wanamaker in Philadelphia (the largest pipe organ in the U.S.), the Paramount (CA) Ice Rink --- and the organ in San Gabriel Mission Playhouse.

In 2017, Larry traded in the upkeep of the Fallbrook property for being pampered with style at Villa Gardens, an assisted living campus in Pasadena, CA., where he was free to add to -- and subtract from -- his fine wine collection.

Family and friends were with him at his quiet passing on July 20, 2019. Larry ashes will be placed beside Lea's in Fallbrook Masonic Cemetery.
