
Now just 29 years old, David Gray has quickly made a NOTE: Every show begins with music played on the pipe organ, an audience sing along,

ORGAN PROJECT

Continuing the story from two months ago, Page 2 of: "San Gabriel Organ Project."

Recap: Bruce and his wife, Ruth joined LATOS in 1961 and both were very active members. Bruce was on the organ installation crew at the Mission Play House, then the "San Gabriel Civic Auditorium."

The organ finally arrived from Brooklyn at San Gabriel on Thanksgiving Day in 1968.

Neal told me the organ was arriving the Wednesday before Thanksgiving day...I said, great. We can unload it on Friday, the day after Thanksgiving which most of us will have off from work. He said, no, the truck driver wants to get back home... we're unloading it on Thanksgiving day... I said we have different plans for Thanksgiving so we won't be there...Neal got a crew together and got it done on Thanksgiving day. Talk about "organuts!" Missing out on Thanksgiving Dinner to unload a dirty old organ... "Them wuz the days!" We stopped by on the way home that evening... They had just finished unloading it. Excellent timing. Neal told me that when he and Ross were re-

moving the organ, they decided that since the Albee no longer had an organ console, they no longer needed the console elevator, so they absconded with it and loaded it into the van with the organ... He asked me, Do you think we can use it.? I replied, possibly...That's how we got started on the lift project that turned out to be as big a project, if-not-bigger, than the organ rebuilding and installation...

Neal and I talked to Frank Sherwood, a crew member who at the time worked for Deluxe check printers. Frank had never done anything like this before and thoroughly enjoyed himself. He turned out to be a very good crew member in more ways than one. Frank, Neal and I decided that since the auditorium was used as the auditorium for a local high school, the console had to go below the orchestra pit to protect it from vandalism. Also, there was the big long console cable umbilicus that was made by Wurlitzer out of 22 Gauge cotton insulated wire. It was about one and one half inches in diameter. The cable jacket consisted of friction tape which was all dried out... This had to be protected from damage. Neal was a steam generation plant operator who worked at a powerhouse for So. Cal. Edison Co. They would work all the shifts with no days off then have several days off in a row...Those days plus some of the shifts when Neal didn't work days. Neal used to work on the organ. During that time he re-taped the console cable.

The console was delivered to Stan Weisbard's house. Stan was a crew member who was a good finish carpenter. My Dad was a Danish carpenter...More about him later. The console was made of mahogany. Stan told Neal that there were so many patches in the console that it would need to be painted instead of a natural finish...Neal asked me what color we should use...I told him it should be white so it would pick up a colored spotlight and look good...He agreed so white it was, with gold trim. Stan painted it with lacquer...The mahogany kept bleeding through so he put on a sealer coat and that solved the problem. He ended up with 19 coats of lacquer on the console...Stan also made new piston rails for the accompaniment manual because they were going to remove the suitable bass function which was never really suitable...They were of mahogany and they-with the rest of the keyboardtrim, turned out beautiful with their natural finish.
